

HIGH SCHOOL COURSE LIST

English

Class: English Language Arts 10 1 & 2 (Formally known as American Literature & Composition 1 & 2)

Description: Students will explore cultural perspectives in American Literature, analyze a variety of texts, develop his or her own voice and improve communication skills involving reading, writing, speaking and listening.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit English credit per session

Class: Literature and Composition 2

Description: This is the second semester of a two-semester course in which students read a variety of literature selections and write in various modes.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit English credit per session

Class: Public Speaking

Description: This course introduces students to a variety of practical speaking experiences and provides opportunities for students to improve their speech preparation and delivery skills.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit English credit per session

Social Studies

Class: American Government

Description: This will provide students with an understanding of the background and recent functioning of the American federal system.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit social studies credit per session

Class: Economics

Description: This course introduces students to basic economic principles. Students will investigate how economics works in their daily lives. They will learn how economics influences business, industry and labor in America.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit social studies credit per session

Class: U.S. History 1

Description: Part one of a two-semester course involves students in the chronological study of the United States since 1877.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit social studies credit per session

Class: U.S. History 2

Description: Part two of a two-semester course involves students in the chronological study of the United States since 1877.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit social studies credit per session

Class: World History 1 (Also known as Ancient Civilization)

Description: This course will focus on the beginnings of human history from Prehistory, the ancient civilizations of Egypt and Mesopotamia, the rise of Greece, Rome, and Christianity, as well as the spread of Islam up to the Middle Ages in Europe. Students who take this course will be challenged to make connections to the past and how "ancient" history has had an impact on the formation of the modern world.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit social studies credit per session

Class: World Geography (Also known as Global Studies)

Description: In this course students will explore the ideas of geography and how they shape the relationship between people, nations, and environments.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit social studies credit per session

Mathematics

Class: Informal Geometry 1 or 2

Description: In this course students will deal with sets of points and their related properties. Benchmarks addressed are segments and angles, parallel and perpendicular lines, triangle relationships, congruent triangles, quadrilaterals, similarity, area of polygons, surface area and volume, right triangles and trigonometry, and circle relationships.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit

Class: Algebra 1 or 2

Description: This course emphasizes the development of skills, techniques and applications associated with linear, exponential and quadratic relationships.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit

Class: Algebra Concepts 1 or 2

Description: This course covers the same concepts as Algebra 1 & 2 with less depth.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit

Physical Education

Class: Health (Formally known as Physical Education 1)

Description: This course includes lecture, group work and projects. Topics covered include human sexuality, nutrition, emotional health, physical fitness, drug use an abuse and decision making.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit physical education credit per session

Class: Physical Education (Formally known as Physical Education 2)

Description: This course will include physical fitness and individual team sports activities.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit physical education credit per session

Science

Class: Physical Science 1 & 2

Description: Topics such as the metric system, atomic structure, matter and energy, heat, light, sound, force and motion, chemical change, weather, geology and astronomy are studied in this course.

Credit: $\frac{1}{2}$ unit science credit per session

Class: General Biology 1 & 2 (Formally known as Life Science 1 & 2)

Description: This course is a presentation of basic biology. Lectures discussions, and laboratories are used to familiarize the student with an understanding of cells, matter and energy, classification, life cycles, genetics, evolution and ecosystems..

For the ninth consecutive summer, the Royal Oak School District is offering a program, which will consist of both core curriculum and elective classes. Students may receive a maximum of one and one-half units of credit. Each class constitutes one-half unit of credit.

COST:

For Royal Oak residents and/or students, the cost per class will be \$200.00, non-residents \$250.00. There will be an additional charge for lab fees of \$5.00 for students taking Physical Science 1 & 2 and/or General Biology 1 & 2.

DISCIPLINE/ATTENDANCE:

All policies and procedures of the Board of Education will be enforced. Upon the third absence, students will be dropped from the class without a refund and parents will be notified.

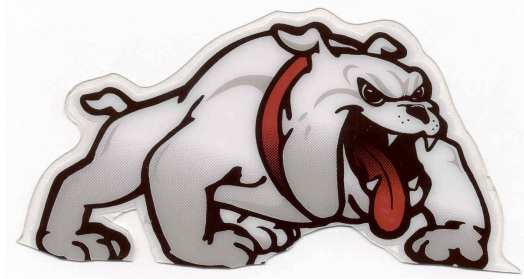

Writing Clinic

A 15-day session is designed to improve writing skills. Write Source 2000 will be used as a resource for the writing activities. Students will learn about and write in a variety of forms. They will also improve their writing mechanics and improve their vocabulary. Success Maker software will be incorporated to focus skill building at the individual student's level. (30 students)

Mathematics Clinic

A 15-day session designed to strengthen mathematics skills. Specific deficit skills will be identified for improvement. Success Maker software will be incorporated to focus skill building at the individual student's level. (30 students)

MIDDLE SCHOOL SUMMER SCHOOL PROGRAM

Math and English Language Arts

Purpose

Summer School is intended to provide students with skill-building activities. These clinics focus on developing effective study habits and critical thinking skills in the content areas for continued academic development.

Progress Reporting

Each student will be provided with a progress report, which will be sent home twice during the session. Parents will sign the report, make comments, and return it to the school. A final achievement evaluation will be made at the end of the summer school.

Summer School Cost

Cost for the summer school is \$150.00 per clinic per student for **Royal Oak residents only**.

Due Dates

The summer school registration and fee are due by June 11, 2010.

Summer school will be on a first-come, first-served basis for **Royal Oak residents only**.

Student Attendance and Behavioral Expectations

Students are expected to be in attendance everyday.
